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<p>The county's Motor Vehicle Registration Fee provides a dedicated source of funding to continue improvements to the county's roads, bridges, and intersections. Since 2012, the county has completed 29 bridge projects. For example, the county in pursuing a permit for a small-scale hydroelectric facility on the Norristown Dam. 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<p>The planning commission’s popular Sustainable Green Parking Lots Guidebook, published in 2016, has helped municipalities incorporate BMPs into parking lot retrofits. The county’s Montco 2040 grant program has funded some parking lot retrofits as well.</p> <p><i>Edit third paragraph to say:</i> The county will continue encouraging installation of stormwater BMPs in both new and existing developments, including retrofits of existing facilities, and will create a hands-on BMP education project, The County should continue to maintain a database of stormwater BMP projects and green developments, and develop and disseminate new educational information on stormwater authorities BMPs. In addition, the county will continue to advocate for adoption of its model Riparian Corridor ordinance, which requires a protected vegetated buffer next to streams.</p>	P. 40	SUSTAINABLE PLACES: Improve stormwater management and reduce the impact of flooding	Wording change.
<p>Recognizing that flooding does not affect all populations equally, the county should work to identify disadvantaged populations that may be disproportionately affected by flooding. The county should assist these populations in understanding the magnitude of the threat, and identifying how these populations can become more resilient to floods. Strategies to address the threat of flooding, and additional hazards such as heat island effect and climate change, should be addressed in the county’s Hazard Mitigation Plan.</p>	P. 41		Updated to highlight the importance of planning for the unknown.

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<p>The county has worked hard to call attention to its natural resource areas. A recently launched “Return on the Environment” project looks to highlight the ways that the county’s open spaces add economic value to many aspects of our lives. Our annual Montgomery Awards have spotlighted projects such as Bridgeport’s Zero Energy Ready Homes, Station Row at Station Square in Lower Merion, Lions Gate at Penn State Abington, and the new SEPTA garage in Lansdale. Staff have contributed to form based zoning codes for Narberth, Norristown, and Lower Merion.
